Roving Exhibition Throughout Chicago’s South, West, and North Sides Curated by the Floating Museum Includes Established and Emerging Artists from Nordic and Local Contexts

Digital Symposium Program Organized by Exhibition Co-Curator Stephanie Cristello Addresses Current Issues of Sustainability in Contemporary Art with Artists and Scholars

CHICAGO, IL—Following the exhibition, related symposiums, and publication at the **Malmö Art Museum** entitled *Sustainable Societies for the Future*, this two-part exhibition and program brings together artists, scholars, organizations, and curators committed to perceiving contemporary art as a possible catalyst for change. The project, which involves artists from the Nordic countries and Chicago context, is presented in alignment with **EXPO CHICAGO** and **ART 2030**—an organization that adopts the lens of the **United Nations’ 17 Sustainable Development Goals** to transform the world within our next decade. The artworks and concepts approached within both the exhibitions and the book engage with issues surrounding biodiversity, racial equity, housing, health and safety, and environmental justice, among other areas of economic, social, and political interest.

The Chicago Edit (October 15–17, 2021) features a curated exhibition program throughout the city organized by the **Floating Museum** alongside a talks program and US book launch with the exhibition co-curator and co-editor of the publication **Stephanie Cristello**.

The site of the exhibition with participating artists **Christian Falsnaes** (DK), **Max Guy** (US), **Minna Henriksson** (FI), **Hesselholdt & Mejlvang** (DK), **Ingela Ihrman** (SE), **Toril Johannessen** (NO) & **Marjolijn Dijkman** (NL), **Cheryl Pope** (US), **Sean Rapset** (US), **Wang & Söderström** (SE/DK), **Amanda Williams** (US), and **Michael x Ryan** (US) uses an LED truck as its platform and will move through the city over a period of three days with a map of exact locations to be announced. The companion Symposium, “Art as a Catalyst for Change,” presented in partnership with **Nordic Talks** will feature many of the participating artists as well as screenings.

Presented in partnership with the City of Malmö, the Malmö Art Museum, Danish Arts in Chicago, Consulate General of Denmark in New York, ART 2030, and Nordic Talks.

Curatorial Statement

Shifting from the space of a modern art museum and repurposing a format generally used for mobile advertisement, the LED exhibition program for *The Chicago Edition* will visit locations across Chicago ranging from major art institutions, community spaces, a vehicle emission testing site, and historical spaces across the south, west, and north sides. The mobile exhibition format builds upon a concept of using the ‘space of flows, positioning a curatorial endeavor beyond a static brick-and-mortar presentation. Imagining possibilities for mobility, geography, and mapping networks, the gesture of the exhibition exists in the continuum of artists examining their relationship to institutions. As James Putman writes, “the modern art museum with its own, purist display aesthetic, is a highly self-conscious viewing space which proclaims the institutionalization of art.”¹

Responding symbiotically to the evolution of museums—ranging from the cabinet of curiosities, or *Wunderkammer*, between the sixteenth and eighteenth centuries; transitioning to the dense accumulations of time-capsule vitrines in the nineteenth century; to the complete contrast of the contemporary art space—Floating Museum’s framework addresses how we view artwork in sustainable ways. Mobile in nature, the presentation of selected artists from the initial full exhibition at the Malmö Art Museum investigates issues of urban landscape and social geography to create juxtapositions and complimentary moments between the Nordic and American artists’ contexts in a moment where international travel is still limited.

Join the editors and artists for the US launch of the *Sustainable Societies for the Future* book, which features individual and collective contributions by artists and scholars from the Nordic and North American art scenes to awaken discussion, reflection, and perspectives that reflect sustainable pathways for the world. Designed by Olga Prader and published by Motto Books in Berlin, the navigation of each text is conceptually categorized through a visual lexicon that follows the mission of the 11 Global Goals set out by the UN, including biodiversity, housing, and gender equality, health and safety, and environmental justice, among other key issues.

Floating Museum is an arts collective based in Chicago, IL, that creates new models exploring relationships between art, community, architecture, and public institutions. Using site-responsive art, design, and programming they explore the potential in these relationships, considering the infrastructure, history, and aesthetics of a space. Floating Museum is co-directed by Avery R Young, Andrew Schachman, Faheem Majeed and Jeremiah Hulsebos-Spofford.

MALMÖ ART MUSEUM

Founded in 1841, the Malmö Art Museum is one of the leading art museums in Scandinavia. The museum building, built in 1937, is located in the Malmö Castle complex in Malmö, Scania, in southern Sweden. Malmö Konstmuseum has one of Sweden's largest art collections, comprising some 40,000 objects. This unique collection is owned by the City of Malmö and its inhabitants. The exhibition *Sustainable Societies for the Future* ran at Malmö Art Museum from February 1–May 23, 2021.

EXPO CHICAGO, The International Exposition of Contemporary & Modern Art features leading international galleries alongside a leading platform for contemporary art and cultural programming. The EXPO CHICAGO program features an unprecedented commitment to host curatorial initiatives during the exposition, including the Curatorial Forum in partnership with Independent Curators International (ICI), and the Curatorial Exchange, which partners with foreign agencies and consulates to expand the exposition's global reach. Kirse Junge-Stevnsborg, co-curator of *Sustainable Societies for the Future*, was a participant of the program in 2018 which initiated the collaboration between EXPO CHICAGO and the Malmö Art Museum. EXPO CHICAGO is also the publisher of THE SEEN, Chicago's only international journal of contemporary and modern art criticism, distributed throughout the United States and Europe.
